Course Description

This undergraduate course serves as an introduction to the study of microeconomics. Microeconomics is a framework that allows us to study the world given certain assumptions about the behavior of individuals and groups. As such, economists research a variety of topics including (but not limited to) trade, labor markets, education, crime, and marriage and fertility. Economists are trained to think in unique ways, and thus provide insights missed by other social scientists. The goal of this course is to equip you with the basics of such thinking. In this endeavor, we explore interesting questions and learn simple tools that economists use to shed light on complicated questions.

Note: This textbook is an additional resource for reviewing the concepts covered in class. You will NOT be responsible for the material in the textbook that is not covered in class.

Requirements (and grading weight)

A. Participation (15%) Everyone is expected to participate in class. Along with asking and answering questions during lectures, we will use Poll Everywhere to facilitate interaction. During class, I will often pause to present multiple-choice questions and you will use the Poll Everywhere software to respond. The anonymized distribution of responses will immediately be displayed in the slides. During the first week of class, I will provide you with a link for free registration with Poll Everywhere. Please do not plan on using a laptop as a means of answering clicker questions.

Your grade will not account for the percentage of Poll Everywhere questions you answer correctly but rather is graded by completion. To allow for illness, technical problems, and other unforeseen emergencies, there is a 10-percentage point curve on your clicker score (not to exceed a total score of 100%). This equates to a day of clicker points.

B. Reaction Statements (5%) Each week I will provide a newspaper article/podcast/other media commentary on a topic relevant to the lecture. You are expected to prepare six to eight sentences that summarize the contents and relate the information to what you have learned. In class, I will ask several students to present what they have prepared. You should expect to present at least once during the six-week class. In the weeks you do not present, I will collect your statements to grade for completion.

- **C. Problem Sets (20%)** There will be 5 problem sets assigned throughout the course. You are encouraged to work in groups on the problem sets, but you must turn in your own solutions. Keep in mind that the problem sets are designed to help you grasp and apply the concepts discussed in class, so the more effort you put into them, the more you get out of them. Late problem set submissions will receive at most half credit. All problem sets are due at the start of class on Tuesdays.
- **D.** Quizzes (30%) Every Thursday there will be a quiz on that week's topics. All the quizzes will take place in the last 30 minutes of class time. A calculator and a single 3 x 5-inch notecard are allowed during the quiz. There are five quizzes in total, but I will drop your lowest score when calculating your grade. There are no makeup quizzes for unexcused absences. If you missed a quiz, that will be counted as your lowest score and will be dropped. You will receive a zero for each additional quiz you miss without an excused absence.
- **E. Final Exam (30%)** The final exam will take place on the last day of class (July 21st, 2022) where the class is held. Per ND rules, you must have a valid excuse from the Dean to take the final exam at a time other than the scheduled time. Other university exam policies can be found online (https://al.nd.edu/advising/academic-policies/final-exams/). If you miss the final exam and do not have an excuse from the Dean, you will receive a score of 0% on your final. For the final, you are allowed to bring in an 8.5 x 11-inch sheet of paper with anything on it legible to your naked eye.
